GIVE IT UP!

We all have desires and things we want. Some are good, some not so good. We choose the ones that are most important to us. Hopefully, we're all wanting to be with our Lord some day. This is a good desire! The Lord told us to "Covet earnestly the best gifts" - 1 Cor 12:31.

When we have something we *really* want—we work to get it. The more important it is to us, the harder we work. As we work though, we should also think about how we can work *more effectively*. We don't want to take two steps forward and then three steps backward! We want to make every step count. The Lord gave us some advice on this: "lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us," - Hebrews 12:1

The Lord tells us to get rid of or *give up* the weights we carry with us, the things that hamper us, that tire us, that keep us from going as fast and as far as we should. These are the **cares** and riches of this **world**. He told us not to worry about these, to care instead for spiritual treasure, things like: patience, mercy, forgiveness, justice and gentleness. On Judgment day, wouldn't you like the Lord to extend those things to **you?** Well, He wants **us** to have these spiritual qualities also. Which leads into another area of *giving it up*.

We all know we ought to give up the **bad** things, the weights that hinder us, but what about the **good** things we have? I.e., In the sense of sowing; we need to give up our **good** things also—we need to share them with others. But, in order to sow, you have to have something to sow. If the farmer ate all of his corn, he wouldn't have any left to plant. We must work to build up these qualities in ourselves, that we'll have some to share with others. The Lord wants us to give away, to others, the good things (SPIRITUAL, see list above) we have, so we'll have even more!

"But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully" - 2 Corinthians 9:6

Sure, give up the bad things like selfishness, harshness and envy, —but let's also give to others, the good things the Lord has given to us: patience, mercy, gentleness, etc. Do that, and we'll find ourselves much closer to obtaining that thing we *really* need:

"Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you. " - James 4:8

They beg that we remember them in our prayers as this is difficult time for them—leaving all they've known, friends and the church in Denver to come here to South Carolina. They plan to spend the holiday at Trica's parent's home in Kansas City, Mo. and get here a few days after Christmas. They'll need help unloading their rental truck that Tue. or Wed. (December 27, 28) and moving into the church residence. Many hands make light work! There'll be plenty for everyone to do and of course, we'll need food for the Parkers and the workers — and the supervisors too.
Make plans to come help if you can, it will be a good time of fellowship.

"For the Son of man is as a man taking a far journey, who left his house, and gave authority to his servants, and to every man his work, and commanded the porter to watch. Watch ye therefore: for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cockcrowing, or in the morning:

Lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping." - Mark 13:34-36

A LEAVING, A LIVING AND A LOOKING

The blessings of God's grace are overwhelming. It is through the grace of God that salvation and redemption is made available for all men. Our Lord tasted death for every man (Heb. 2:9). It is his will that all men come to a knowledge of the truth (1 Tim. 2:4) and he is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance (2 Pet. 3:9). We've often correctly defined grace as "God's unmerited favor." It is getting something that we do not deserve (Eph. 2:8-9; Rom. 5:6-8).

There is no doubt that the grace of God blesses, but equally so, the passage of scripture in Titus 2:11-14 demonstrates that the grace of God also obligates. It requires and teaches certain responsibilities for all who would enjoy its favor. The meaning of Titus 2:11-14 can be summed up with three main points, all beginning with the letter "L."

I. A LEAVING First of all, the grace of God demands that we leave behind certain practices of the past and begin walking in the righteousness of God. We must leave behind ungodliness, worldly lust, and works of the flesh (Titus 2:12; Gal. 5:19-21). After we have become recipients of the benefits of God's grace, it is the cross before me, the world behind me, no turning back (Luke 9:62; Luke 17:32). We must remember to leave the "old man" behind in the watery grave where he was buried (Romans 6:4ff). Those who come to God must remember to love not the world neither the things that are in the world (1 John 2:15). We must leave behind fleshly lusts which war against the soul (1 Peter 2:11). Thus, first of all, the grace of God that brings salvation also brings the responsibility to leave ungodliness behind.

II. A LIVING The grace of God not only demands that we leave ungodliness but that we live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world (Titus 2:12). It is not sufficient merely to eliminate evil from our lives; we must replace the evil with good.

Jesus told the story of the unclean spirit gone out of a man, walking through dry places, seeking rest and finding none. The unclean spirit then decided to return to his former residence. When he arrived, he found it empty, swept, and garnished. Thus finding the vacancy, he went and took with him seven spirits more wicked than himself and they entered in and dwelled there again. Jesus said that the last state of this man was worse than the first (Matt. 12:43-45).

The obvious point of this declaration by our Lord is that it is not sufficient to merely eliminate evil from our lives. We must replace that evil with good. We must "put on" as well as "put off" (Col. 3:10,12; Eph. 4:24; 2 Pet. 1:5-11). We must be different or peculiar from the world not only in what we don't do, but also in the things that we are doing. We must be sure to give attention to the "thou shalts" of the gospel as well as the "thou shalt nots" (James 4:17; Matt.25:31-46; Luke 16:19-31; Rev. 3:14-19). Jesus is certainly the best example of what it means to live soberly, righteously, and godly. He kept Himself pure and went about doing good (1 Pet. 2:21; Acts 10:38).

III. A LOOKING Not only must we leave behind ungodliness and worldly lust, and live soberly, righteously, and godly, but furthermore, we ought also to look for that blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior (Titus 2:13). This passage is a reference to the second coming of Christ.

A companion passage that emphasizes the importance of living and looking is found in 2 Pet. 3:10-14. In view of the fact that this world and all that is in it will someday perish in fire, Peter asked the question, "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought you to be in all holy conversation and godliness, looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God?"..."Wherefore, beloved, seeing that we look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot, and blameless."

Therefore, righteous living must precede confident looking. Are you looking forward to the second coming? Can you, with Paul, say "Oh Lord, Come" (1 Cor. 16:22).

CONCLUSION The grace of God that brings salvation brings a host of blessings. But it also brings responsibility. We must never forget that the grace of God obligates us to leave, to live, and to look. Let us be diligent in making certain that we have met the demands of leaving and living so that we might confidently be looking for the second coming of Christ.
