THE STRUGGLES OF A GOOD HEART

"And when we all had fallen to the ground, I heard a voice speaking to me and saying in the Hebrew language, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me? It is hard for you to kick against the goads.' So I said, 'Who are You, Lord?' And He said, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" - Acts 26:14-15.

The gospel is designed only for people with good hearts (Lk. 8:15). Those who do not have good hearts see nothing of value in the gospel and turn away from it (Jn. 6:26, 64-66). However, we often oversimplify this principle and assume that as soon as a good heart encounters the gospel, he is immediately swept away by its beauty and surrenders to his Lord. In reality, conversion is usually not that simple. Even the best of hearts sometime wrestle with the changes that conversion requires.

The story of Saul, the early archenemy of Christianity, is a good example of this. Let's reconstruct the sequence of events that led to his conversion, and notice how a good heart can sometimes struggle to accept the truth.

Recall Paul's later statement that he had "lived in all good conscience before God until this day" (Ac. 23:1). His heart was not dominated by selfish interests such as greed, lust, or revenge, but by a desire to please God. "I myself always strive to have a conscience without offense toward God and men" (Ac. 24:16). Here was a man with a good heart, striving to serve God to the best of his knowledge.

Of course, his knowledge was deficient. Oh, he had heard the truth preached alright, by men like Stephen and others (see Ac. 6:9; 7:58). But that message did not fit into the rigid template of "truth" that had such a tight grip on his mind. So he rejected it outright, without pausing to consider "what if?" Later, Paul would characterize his response as the reaction of "an insolent man" (1 Tim. 1:13)—although he was quick to add that he had reacted "ignorantly in unbelief." So it is possible for a good heart to be temporarily blinded by the prejudice of long-held convictions.

But Saul had not only heard the gospel preached, he had also seen it practiced, specifically at the stoning of Stephen. To witness a man call for the forgiveness of the ones who at that very moment were stoning him to death must have jarred Saul's confidence (Ac. 7:58-60). Throughout his furious campaign of terror against the Christians in the years that followed, that image must have been gnawing at Saul's mind. (Many years later, as Paul neared his own martyrdom, he spoke almost the exact words as Stephen, 2 Tim. 4:16).

So when Jesus appeared to Saul on the road to Damascus, He did not have to dangle Saul over the fires of hell to convince him to change. Saul's own good heart had been quietly "kicking against the goads" for some time, struggling with the truth. All it took was one startling image of the resurrected Lord to trigger the conversion.

What's the lesson here? Good hearts sometimes require a long process of contemplation before accepting the truth. We must be patient, and allow them the time to struggle with the implications of that truth in their lives.

GIVE ME A CHANCE TO SERVE

Have you ever asked the Lord to open a door for you? To give you a chance to serve him? It's a good thing to pray for. In Matthew 7:7 the Lord promised us "Knock, and it shall be opened unto you".

How many of us, though, **believe** that promise? How many of us **keep** asking, and asking? Maybe we never seem to get the chance we're looking for. Maybe that's the problem—we're not **seeing** the chances or opportunities to do good the Lord is giving us. Maybe we're being too picky or choosy: "Not that one Lord, I want a **really** good work to do!"

Let's remember that it is the **Lord's work** we're about, not ours. It's He who gives us the opportunities we have. It's He that gives the increase:

"Who then is Paul, and who is Apollos, but ministers by whom ye believed, even as the Lord gave to every man? I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth any thing, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase." - 1 Corinthans 3:5-7

Let's trust Him, that He'll give us what we need, because He **has**—His Word, the gospel! Let's take advantage then of the opportunities we have, no matter how small they might seem to us. Let's open our eyes and hearts to them:

"He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much." - Luke 16:10

Maybe when we want to do some great thing, what we're *really* wanting is to say: "Look what I did." **We** want the recognition for the deed; from people instead of from God. But the real power and strength we have can only come from God:

"I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me"—Philp 4:13

He wants us to know this and **act** like we know it. He'll be pleased with us if we do—if we trust in His power and strength, just as He was pleased with the church in Philadelphia. Look at what the Lord praised about them:

"I know thy <u>works</u>: behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it: for thou hast a <u>little</u> strength, and hast <u>kept</u> my word, and hast <u>not denied</u> my name." - Revelation 3:8

They didn't **deny** the name of Christ by seeking to please themselves and trusting in their <u>own</u> power or wisdom. They humbly *did* what the Lord put in front of them (the essence of humility is subordinating ourselves), trusting in Him and His word - looking to please God and not themselves. Let's do the same, so our Lord will say the same—of **us**.
